1. Concept Note

The Mediterranean region is facing unprecedented, interlinked challenges of land degradation and water scarcity that jeopardize ecosystems and rural livelihoods. The intensifying climatic pressures are exacerbating the societal tensions across the Mediterranean basin, resulting further uncertainty in the context of wider social-ecological conflicts in many different sectors and domains.

Science can provide the evidence to support adaptation pathways and enhance the resilience of dryland socio-ecosystem. The PRIMA partnership has created unprecedented opportunities for the scientific community to empower a new generation of researchers and innovators to rethink the futures of Mediterranean land and water. The inclusive efforts put in place by PRIMA, bridging together scientists, entrepreneurs and civil society organizations, are the best seeds of peaceful and prosperous futures rooted in sustainable land and water science, approaches and practices.

This conference is designed to distill the key messages from different PRIMA projects, focusing on the future of land and water in the Mediterranean. The forward-looking perspective emphasizes the active engagement of the next generation of researchers and leaders from both the public and private sectors who have seized the opportunities offered by the PRIMA projects. This will be facilitated by the new "NextGen4MED" initiative, jointly launched by the SALAM-MED, OurMed and NatMed PRIMA funded projects.

The event is designed by the SALAM-MED Project in collaboration with all PRIMA projects on land and water participating in the initiative, to identify, implement, and promote innovative and inclusive approaches and pathways to sustainable land and water management across Mediterranean drylands. This initiative will serve as a unique platform to **distill key findings**, **share lessons learned**, and **build bridges** for the **next generation** of researchers, by defining priority lists of key themes and topics and project implementation practices.

Objectives

- → Distill key findings from PRIMA projects addressing land and water management in the Mediterranean.
- → Highlight scalable and innovative solutions for sustainable land and water practices across the Mediterranean
- → Foster dialogue on the role of Science Diplomacy as a tool for regional cooperation
- → Create new spaces for intergenerational dialogue and youth-led visions through the NextGen4MED initiative
- → Enhance synergies with other PRIMA-funded projects to build a cohesive Mediterranean agenda

Academy of Athens Panepistimiou 28, 106 79, Athens - Greece

The venue is centrally located and well connected by public transportation.

Metro Station: Panepistimio (Greek: Πανεπιστήμιο) - Line 2

4. Transportation & Airport Access

Transportation from Athens International Airport to Panepistimio

✓ 1. Metro – Fastest and Most Convenient

- Route:
 - Take Metro Line 3 (Blue Line) from the airport to Syntagma Station (~40 min)
 - o Change at Syntagma to Line 2 (Red Line), one stop to Panepistimio Station
 - Also walking distance from Syntagma to Academy about 10 min
- **Total time**: ~50 minutes
- Fare: €9 (valid for 90 minutes, including transfers)
- Schedule: ~6:30 AM to ~11:30 PM, every 30 minutes

🛼 2. Express Bus X95 + Metro

- Route:
 - Board the X95 Express Bus outside the arrivals terminal (Gates 4–5) →
 Syntagma Square
 - o At Syntagma, transfer to **Metro Line 2** (Red) → Panepistimio





o Also walking distance from Syntagma to Academy about 10 min

• **Total time**: ~60–75 minutes (depending on traffic)

• Fare: €5.50 (bus) + ~€1.20 (metro ticket if transfer exceeds 90 min)

• **Service**: Operates **24/7**, buses every 15–40 minutes

Credit or debit cards (Visa or Mastercard) can be used directly on the metro and buses. No ticket purchase is required.

€40 (day: 05:00-24:00) €55 (night: 00:00-05:00)

• Travel time: ~35–45 minutes (traffic-dependent)

5. Recommended Hotels in and near Syntagma Area

The Academy of Athens is situated in the Syntagma neighborhood—home to both Syntagma Square and the Syntagma Metro station (Lines 2 & 3). All listed hotels lie within Syntagma or its immediate surroundings, ensuring minimal travel time to the venue. Please note that 5-star hotels may be reimbursed provided that they offer a more cost-effective option compared to hotels of a lower category. The following hotels are within walking distance and located in safe areas. Any other options nearby would also be fine.
